- The spice saffron is the dried stigmas from the flowers of *Crocus sativus*, the autumn blooming crocus.
- Saffron can cost as much as \$5000 per pound.
- It takes about 150,000 flowers to produce a kilogram of saffron.
- There are four main compounds that give saffron its taste, aroma and color—crocin, crocetin, picrocrocin, and safranal.
